# Course Name: French VI <br> Course Level: Level 6 <br> Course Code: <br> Course Length: 2 semesters <br> Prerequisite: Successful completion of French 1-5 

## Description

In this course, the students will review French skills to communicate about the evolution of society, the differences between generations, researching progress and the pursuit of a career. Students will also learn to use advance grammatical tenses. Emphasis is placed on the four fluency skills of listening, speaking, reading and writing. Beginning with simple and interesting conversational uses of the language and cultural awareness, students are eventually exposed to the systematic study of grammar, literature and culture of French-speaking people.

$40 \%$ of a student's grade will be comprised of performance data from different forms of assessment, for example: lesson tests, projects and compositions.

## Student Expectations:

- All students are expected to be on time for class and to bring all materials every day.
- The only way to learn a second language is to practice, practice, practice. Daily attendance is crucial.
- Students are often required to perform oral presentations in French. Courtesy, therefore, is imperative.


## Homework Policy:

- Students should expect homework after every class meeting.
- All homework will be checked in at the beginning of each class. Any assignment that is not completely finished at that time will not receive credit.
- Students are expected to correct their own papers during the homework discussion.
- Late assignments must be turned in prior to the quiz on that particular Paso. No credit will be given on assignments turned in after the quiz.
- Students who miss class for school-related purposes are required to complete all work as though they were in class that day.
- Cheating on any assignment, no matter how small, will result in severe consequences. (consult Student Handbook)
- Extra credit: Will be available on a varying basis, but students should by no means expect extra credit to be given at any given time.
- On the agenda: devoirs=homework, pratique=workbook, libre=textbook, conversation=dialogue, dessins=drawings, examen=quiz


## Test Policy:

It is expected that students will prepare appropriately for quizzes in class. The chance to retake a quiz will remain at the teacher's discretion. Extra credit is often offered in connection with most quizzes as well. If a retake is offered by the teacher, students must make an appointment to retake the quiz either at lunch or after school.

## Work and Social Habits:

A student's sense of humor and willingness to contribute to class discussion is a necessary element of world language study. The students' marks for work and social habits will be based on cooperation, preparedness, promptness and readiness to join in conversation.
